He encourages people to take time out of their busy schedules to volunteer and support organizations who committedly sacrifice their all to make a world a better place.



DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION IS A PROFOUNDLY BUSINESS ACCELERATING PHILOSOPHY THAT HARNESSES THE GROWING POTENTIAL OF TECHNOLOGY, PEOPLE AND PROCESSES. IT CREATES A POSITIVE IMPACT THAT GOES FAR BEYOND ECONOMIC OBJECTIVES.

IT CREATES DISRUPTIVE BUSINESS MODELS, IMPROVES SERVICE DELIVERY AND MAKES LIVES EASIER FOR ALL



n simple terms, Digital transformation refers to the adoption of new-age technology to digitize analog business processes. It creates a digital connection with customers by disrupting conventional business models.

Digital transformation empowers businesses to know their customers better and provides personalized services that are flawless and competitively priced. Mobile, Cloud, Internet of Things, Analytics & Connectivity are the building blocks that are ushering the digital transformation era.

Wikipedia, lists Digital transformation as able to generate a revenue of 100 trillion dollars, the only other field able to generate this financial behemoth is asteroid mining, which Africa is unprepared to handle in all its complexity as no African country is capable of sending a man to space not to even imagine the moon, hence my recommendation would be for us to focus energy on the seemingly achievable and less expensive solution, Digital transformation.

The 4 Pillar; Technologies of the Future

The right technologies foster growth and leadership opportunities, which are critical to building digitally native enterprises. IDC considers the 4 Pillar technologies as essential to success for businesses trying to navigate the digital economy. These four technologies will continue to dramatically expand capabilities; here's how.

Big Data & Analytics

The amount of data available to collect and analyze to inform better decisions is already enormous and growing. IDC research shows that the amount of high value data worth analyzing will be times two in the year 2020. To thrive in the digital economy, Africa needs to view data as a strategic asset not only for internal decision support, but for generating revenue or for providing other desired value. In the digital economy, data is also digital capital.



Cloud

As cloud adoption continues to expand, the very concept of what clouds are, and what they can do will change in important ways. Cloud services will become much more distributed, secure, industry specialized, and intelligent – which means leaders will need to stay on top of how this technology is tailored and deployed. Enterprises are quickly realizing that the cloud is required for digital natives and are investing heavily in response. By 2020, greater cloud spending for IT and cloud services will exceed \$500 billion globally.

Mobility

Smartphones, tablets, and wearable technologies allow businesses to continuously interact with employees, customers, partners, and other stakeholders in new ways, creating customized digital experiences. Business leaders need to assess the most appropriate business processes and focus areas where they can create these customized experiences. This is a clear opportunity for strong IT leadership to pair with technology to create lasting Digital Transformation for an enterprise. After all, the mobile market will move 2.1 billion units globally by 2019; customers are using mobile technologies, which means businesses need to as well.

Social

Social is the connective branch that better aligns businesses with stakeholders, in addition to aligning internal business units and lines of business. To become transformative in their use of social business, enterprises will need to solve for challenges to create openness and connectivity in their ecosystems in order to preserve alignment and deliver optimal experiences expected by customers.

IDC predicts that by 2020, 40% of e-commerce will be enabled or influenced by a consumer's social network in an automated way.

Digital Transformation is turning the tables across industries creating a shuffle in the top players. Companies like Facebook, Airbnb, Uber & Amazon came into existence in a short span of time. But, today they are market leaders & disruptors in their own domains.

The Mortar: Innovation Accelerators

Innovation Accelerators, as defined by IDC, are the next wave of 3rd Platform technologies critical to business transformation. Capturing growth in the rapidly scaling digital marketplace will require maximizing on these key growth drivers:

Cognitive/Artificial Intelligence (AI)

Many companies have already started adding cognitive/Al components and functionality to their products to provide predictions, assistance, recommendations, and guidance on tasks within the software. IDC predicts that either machine learning analytic techniques or much broader cognitive/ Al functionality will be included in upcoming versions of most enterprise software, including all business analytics solutions.

This functionality isn't just for data scientists, but will be included for customer experience, supply chain, collaboration, human resources, or other applications, accelerating transformation across the entire business. Organizations should be examining their current business processes to determine where cognitive/Al technologies will be deployed to achieve the best business outcomes. One place to start may be with workforce; by 2019, 75% of workers whose daily tasks involve the use of enterprise applications will have access to intelligent personal assistants to augment their skills and expertise.

The Internet of Things (IoT)

The Internet of Things continues to gain momentum in organizations looking to foster DX. While many business leaders recognize the benefits that connected devices can bring to their operations to enhance experiences for consumers and for employees, questions around the security of both the devices and the data that they gather, and use give them pause. As a result, by 2019, more than 75% of IoT device manufacturers will improve their security and privacy capabilities, making them more trustworthy partners for technology buyers.

Business leaders should conduct a risk assessment to identify the perceived risks associated with data collection and IoT device activity. Measure the risks against the opportunity for an attacker to thwart established controls for data confidentiality, integrity, and availability and/or abuse device components to cause a potential public safety hazard. It's up to business leaders to guide this process and to encourage a company culture that embraces the transformative elements that IoT can bring.



Next Generation Security

Security is a pivotal topic for all organizations. The sheer amount of data collected and used in the course of business today, and the increasing number of high-profile security breaches reported globally, offer multiple areas of concern. How will digital natives use next generation security fight back? It starts with planning and choosing the right partners. Enterprises can benefit from professional services providers and cybersecurity vendors that understand the technology and can advise how to use it for DX. Many of these partners will also use other Innovation Accelerators to strengthen security offerings.

Robotics

New developments in robotics will have the potential to disrupt the business ecosystem for all industries and companies' IT functions. Robotics is an area that will shape not only consumer-related decisions in the digital economy, but employee-related ones too. By 2020, robotics growth will accelerate the talent race, leaving 35% of roboticsrelated jobs vacant, while the average salary for knowledgebased workers will increase by at least 60%. In order to make robotics an effective growth accelerator, business leaders should monitor the development of technology trends and constantly review the connectivity and bandwidth infrastructure required by robots for real-time access to cloud-based analytics, intelligence, and new task skills. They should also keep an eye on how governments and markets will shape the ways enterprises deploy robots, as government regulations and public sentiment will try to preserve jobs and reinforce standards around privacy and safety in robotics usage.

Augmented and Virtual Reality (AR/VR)

AR/VR experiences have been a mainstay of science-fiction, but this technology is beginning to make a significant impact on the way businesses operate. IDC predicts that three out of 10 consumer-facing Fortune 5000 companies will experiment with AR or VR as part of their marketing efforts in 2017. And by 2019, 10% of all web-based meetings will include an AR component, driving disruption of the \$3 billion web conferencing market.

3D Printing

3D printing has grown from an experimental opportunity to a technology that can change the way IT and businesses operate. IDC predicts that by 2018, 3D printing will be a mainstream technology market with new participation from large and established document printing, contract manufacturing, and electronics vendors. Use cases and applications will vary widely from industry to industry, but in the digital economy, companies should begin thinking now about how to best use this growth driver to advance their own interests. For example, by 2019, 25% of the top 2,000 global manufacturers will explore 3D print-capable smart robots to increase worker safety and reduce repair time by 30% in highly complex environments in order to operate more efficiently and safely, providing better service overall. 
Every country that has had an economic transformation in the past fifty years has had a massive foreign direct investment, and banked on making it bigger annually, Africa needs to do the same with DT.

This bogus is what Ilead has been tackling since late 2018, identifying and unveiling these people (PWDs) who are simply no

different from any other persons who deserve to be given an opportunity at being the best of themselves and not be reduced to the already obsolete degenerated "status quo".

Aside that, Temilade was from a humble background which my parents will see as an insult to their personality, they wouldn't support me getting

married to a blind lady.

No one understood what I felt for Temi. But whatever it was, I didn't want to recover. I knew Temi was all I wanted and needed in a woman. She was all I needed to scale through every huddle in life. She was my vibe to achieve more. I didn't see myself depending on my parents' wealth. I wanted to be able to stand alone without falling back on them for financial support.

"Mum, Dad, I want to inform you that I have a woman in my life" I started calculating how best to make them accept the woman I love.

Mum's face suddenly became brighter. She smiled at me.

"Ok, who is the lucky lady that is about to become my daughter in law?" Mum giggled. The smile on my face faded.

"Temilade. Her name is Temilade".

Mum's smiled brighter, revealing her gap teeth and dimples.

"What school did she graduate from and what does she do for a living? Who is her father?"

"Mum, I'll bring her here tomorrow. You'll find out then" Mum's smile disappeared. I read curiosity in her expression. I ran to my room, locked the door and threw myself on the bed. "Temilade doesn't deserve to be blind. She is full of love and has a large heart. Why Temilade?" I rolled



on the bed with my eyes shut. I hated life for being unfair to the only woman I love.

The next day was Saturday. I had called Temilade's sister the previous night to get her sister ready for today as she'll be meeting my parents.

I pulled the car to a stop in front of Temilade's house. I smiled while dialing Tomi's line. It rang but she didn't pick. I dialed again.

"Tadahhh! We are here" Tomi announced, tapping the car. I unlocked the door and she helped Temi sit beside me. While Tomi opened the back door and stepped in.

"But you didn't inform me you'll be coming with us, Tomi" I asked.

"I insisted she follows me" Temi responded

"Alright, it's fine. By the way, you look stunning" I squeezed her hand in mine. She smiled. There was a chemistry. I dropped her hand hurriedly before I cross the line. Konji has not been merciful lately. Especially whenever I'm with Temilade. I turned on the ignition and zoomed en route Senator Banjo's Estate.

"My son, you have brought our wife, right? Your Dad and I will be there in split seconds" Mummy responded from the master bedroom as soon as I announced my presence.

"My daughter, you are beautiful" was all I kept on

hearing when I stepped into to the living room with a tray of fruit drink and glass cups. I was shocked to find Tomi in Mum's embrace. Confusion was written all over Tomi's face.

"Mum, you are hugging the wrong person. That's my fiancée's sister"

"Ehen, didn't you say it was your fiancée you were bringing home?

"Why the noise, Mummy Kola? What is happening here?" Daddy joined the scene Mum created even if he knows Mummy is dramatic in nature. I couldn't look at my Dad's face.

I bowed my head and turned it in Temilade's direction. Her face was socked with tears. Tomi's hand was on Temi's back. She was consoling her sister. I felt a liquid substance running down my cheeks. I sobbed unknowingly and painfully. I just made my heartthrob cry. I bit my lips in regret for bringing Temilade to my parents in the first place.

"Your only child has brought a blind lady home as wife!" Mum replied Dad, pointing at Temilade. "Baba Kola, your son has disgraced us. He has brought shame to the Banjo's family." She stood up and grabbed me by my trousers belt. "You must kill me today! Kill me o!" I tried to let go but couldn't. The mucus that had flowed from my nose to my jaw dripped on mum's hand. I maintained silence. I felt so weak for not saving Temi by preventing this whole dramatic occurrence.

"Mama Kola, be calm. Let's talk about this"

"Talk about what, Baba Kola? You were not here to witness your son calling a blind girl the love of his life! Ahhh! Instablog9ja will carry it, Media houses too will make a head line out of this! And before you know it you will see it on the news that Senator Banjo's only child got married to a blind girl! Ahhh, omo yi ti ba aye mi je! (this child has destroyed my life) she threw herself in the air and landed on the hard tiles.

I managed to get Temi and her sister out of the house that day. I apologized to her and made her understand that what I feel for her is undying. Though she tried to plead with me to be on the good side of my parents even if that will cost us our relationship, but I would rather be disowned by Senator Banjo than to live without Temilade.

I packed my things out of the house and lodged in a hotel. I already put a call through to a real estate agent for an apartment and he promised to get back to me as soon as he could.

My phone rang very early the next morning and it was Tomi.

"Kola! Temilade!" is all she said.

"what happened to Temilade"?

"Temi! Poison!"

As soon as I heard this, I ended the call, picked my car key and zoomed off to Temilade's house. I was stunned to meet crowd in their compound. "Temilade drank insecticide" Tomi ran into my embrace, crying profusely. My heart skipped a bit. Was Temilade dead? No! That can't happen. "What happened? Temilade is not dead, right?" I inquired, welcoming the mucus from her nose to my shoulder.

"I was washing this evening when she told me to give her insecticide, that she was being bitten by mosquito. Since the insecticide has a welcoming scent that can't harm her. I decided to bring it for her not knowing she wanted to spray it in her mouth. I entered the room and saw her groaning in pain. She held her stomach and was rolling on the floor. I tried to find out what the problem was, and she told me she continuously sprayed the insecticide in her mouth because she doesn't want to come between you and your parents, and neither can she live without you". Tomi cried aloud, throwing herself in the air. I caught her and we landed on the ground.

So, I have lost the only lady I love because of my parent's unfair discrimination against Persons with Disabilities. Where will I start from? Can I ever heal? Can I ever forgive myself?

I thought of the future I had fantasized with Temilade. Our chance of being together forever has just been crumbled. I hated myself for allowing my parents despise the woman I love because of she was blind. Maybe I should have defended the love of my life.

Maybe if I had reassured Temilade of what I truly feel for her and told her nothing was ever going to come between us right there and then in Senator Banjo's living room or maybe if I had held her in my embrace instead of feeling pity for her and crying from my mum's drama, she would not have attempted suicide. Maybe she would have been convinced enough that we can scale through. Maybe she would have lived.

I never returned home. I never got married. I channeled my strength to my career and sponsored Temilade's siblings' education to PhD level. I still send money to her parents. I have traveled to over 32 countries and everywhere I go, I preach against 'Discrimination against Persons with Disability'. I have forgiven my parents. I saw my Mum telling people on Social Media to be fair with persons with disability because every child is the same. I smiled. It was evident she had learnt from her mistake. My Dad still speaks to me over the phone and each time he calls, he asks for my forgiveness as he now knows better. He was in tears when I told him last year that I have forgiven both him and mum.

My 55th birthday is tomorrow, and I intend to paint the world with "No Discrimination Against Persons with Disability" yet again with Voice of Temilade Team.
